"After a darling music box introduction we enter a world of twisted techno-pop ditties with slight Devo/Oingo-Boingo new-wave flavorings. These are all well constructed crafty sounding and dance-

able pop songs made with programmed percussion, guitars and lots of weird space-age sounding keyboards. The instruments, vocals (of the affected

English-boy type) arrangements and production all work together to create a futuristic, off-beat dance music. While I wouldn't compare this to say, R. Stevie Moore, Static Action does appeal to me in a similar way on one level; if mass-media pop music had this much vitality and inventiveness I'd probably listen to the radio a lot more than I do now!" - Bryan Sale

The second Static Action album contains more of the same. Electro-Pop dance tunes with socially

conscious themes. Improved sound-quality over the first album combines with a more cohesive song

structure. This album explores more fully the art of song-writing and production using the CX5M music computer. Song titles include "Beauty of the Tiger" and "Points", a humorous look at getting a mortgage loan, star-

ring your favorite slick con-artist. A necessary follow-up to "danger zone".

A break from the Static Action tradition, this more personal album by R. Michael Torrey contains some country/folk styled music, as well as a couple of cover tunes. One of the

songs is a version of "Sunlight and Shadow", a P.J. Otto tune with words by Torrey. Most of the music was composed and performed on the CX5M music computer, with the exceptions of "don't know", which was done using the Emu Emulator III and "Ohio", which is pure acoustic guitar. The recording quality is the best so far, and the insert includes words and photos.

"This follow-up to "Ant & Bee" is a self-described "noise fest" featuring 8 cuts with distorted and layered vocals. It also features a variety of instruments, from more common items such as guitars, keyboards and drums, to the more exotic: marbles, kazoos, automobiles and a popcom popper! It all makes for an intriguing and clever tape, with adecidedly playful tone.

Muhs and Torrey get a bit carried away on the longer, spoken word tracks (such as the title cut and their epic, four part "Medley"), leaving the listener waiting for a break in rhythmic style or treatment. In it's favor, however, the tape has its share of more ethereal treats, most notably the tracks "Church of the Asteroids" and "Serengheti Freeway". An unusual and satisfying tape." - Perry Glorioso

This third Ant & Bee release actually sounds more like early Mata Rata, in some respects, but don't despair, there're plenty of cuts with the good ol' strange and stranger sound of A&B. Opening with the avant-jazz number

"Sweet Sticky Buns", the cassette quickly slides into the more familiar processed-vocals, obscure story lines and gendre-bending musical treatments that A&B fans have come to know and love. Cuts include a sonically-backed reading from the CIA's handbook on terrorist activities distributed to the Contra forces in Nicaragua, Muhs yelling a failing junior high student's essay, and guest artists playing saxaphones and other musical instruments on some purely instrumental numbers. There is also a largely unrecognizable beatles-thrash parody titled "Patty in the Clouds with Pancakes". Altogether an authentic Ant & Bee production.

"Anyone who does a cover of a Dr. Suess story has got to be cool. On the other hand. Charles Laurel, Eric Muhs and R. Michael Torrey are cool anyway. Following up on Out of Nowhere (Laurel) and Ant and Bee (Muhs, Torrey) with the best of each, this is a memorable melange of warped and twisted popmuzick. Taking the improvisational and eclectic sides of the latter and coupling it with the rhythmic lyricism of the former, the trio play exotic and primitive musick, recalling at times early '70s "progressive rock". Soon to be classics include a Step-

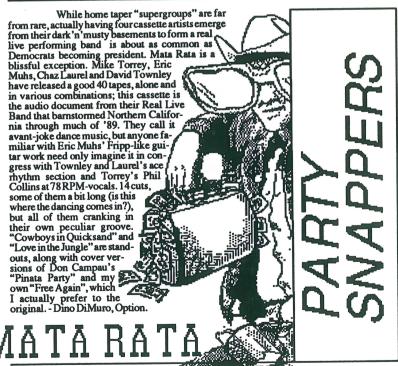
Rata

This Halloween album is chock full of 'spooky' songs, including a musical adaption of a Dr. Suess tale called "What was I scared of?". The album also marks the first appearence of drummer David

Townley to the Mata Rata team of Eric Muhs, Charles Laurel and R. Michael Torrey, iorns & tales set

with the seminal version of "RADIATION Man", which quickly became one of the band's trademark numbers. Scary sounds, weird rythms and twisted story lines fill the tape, which includes a reading of "The Strand Wolf" from Thoma Pynchon's V, ably spoken and orchestrated by Laurel. The singular vocal treatments of Mr. Muhs grace the visionary "In Your Future", and his unique style on guitar and keyboards is well-represented on this third Mata Rata release.

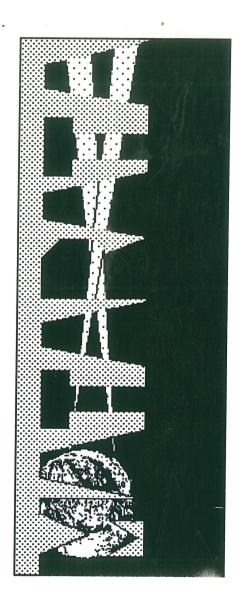

This is Mata Rata's second theme album, a rocket-opera that goes beyond the known world and takes us with it. The basic story line in-

volves a comet which passes within 6 feet of a small town in Kansas, snatching up willing and unwilling humans for

it's trip around the galaxy. A more traditional Mata Rata tape, recorded after the tragic loss of drummer David Townley to husband and fatherhood. The band's original members bravely struggled to put their brush with stardom and fame behind them and get on with the business of producing music in any way possible. The result is this stirring and poignant look at the world of today and how to escape it through lunacy. Eric Muhs seems to have really found his niche in vocal stylings on this work, commanding attention. The cassette is packaged with a wonderfully strange poster and song lyrics. A necessary addition to your Mata Rata collection.



"A pleasing, upbeat collection of instrumental tunes created entirely on the Yamaha CX5M Music computer. Otto's compositions are extremely basic and straightforward - a strategy that barely avoids boredom by evoking a childlike sense of wonder as the simple melodies unfold. The choice of timbres recalls early Genesis, UK, and old-fashioned music boxes (in fact, "China Doll Waltz" is itself a perfectly simulated music box tune, complete with a slowing-down spring) A couple of cuts cross the line into beginner piano exercises, but the overall positive atmosphere renders such complaints moot." -Dino DiMuro

straightforward melodies are made especially interesting by the pleasantly esoteric tone colors, which are bright and clean, but never sterile. The ballad-like "Once in a Blue Room" is achingly tender, and yet totally devoid of

this a real pleasure to listen to. The great majority of the music is created and performed using the CX5M music computer, and several added guitar solos by accomplished players add interest. Pacing is good, with a variety of songs; you never get bored.

P.J.:Otto

This time Mr. Otto adds a couple vocal tunes to his excellent collection of pop-oriented tunes. The songs "The American Dream" and "The Instigator" are ably sung by Jim Leis. They deal with the desire for instant riches and warnings about Bad Boys. The lyrics were written by Otto also, and although his writing efforts aren't quite as

writing efforts aren't quite as accomplished as his compositional abilities, the songs are interesting. More great mock-styled songs, with some

interesting. More great rock-styled songs, with some really nice sounding effects. "Lady of the Nile" brings a taste of the Middle East. "Ice Nine" (Have you read your Vonnegut lately?) has a cold and clammy feel to it, as well it should. P.J. has developed a very comfortable rapport with his CX5M music computer, and seems able to coax it into doing all kinds of things you wouldn't expect. Surprise! There's also an excellent sax solo performed by Randy Roach in a tune called "Mistress". Brother John Otto provides some tasty guitar licks in that one, too. The cover art is by another brother, Chris, whose artwork graces all of P.J. Otto's tapes. Well mixed and a pleasure to listen to.

Word has it that P.J. Otto is planning on some experimental releases. Something to do with random sequence generation. Sounds good, huh? We're all looking forward to it.

"One of the interesting things about recordings is that it's possible to hear them without any information about whoever produced them and come up with some interpretation that bears little relevance to the real state of affairs. According to the liner notes, this recording is brought tot the man who remixes it by an intermediary. It's producer is reputedly an illegal

Haitian immigrant who lives in seclusion somewhere in the mountains, is paralyzed from the waist down, and left the Julliard School of Music out of fear of being 'rigified'. That's

quite a pedigree, isn't it? What you'; ll hear on this cassette is anything but unusual, though, a four-track recording of analog synth sweetened slightly by a little reverb. The timbres are extremely conventional - wide filter sweeps, short ADSR percussion patches with the occasional LFO wobble thrown in, and dizzying pan effects. The compositions are all given pretty heavy titles ('About Life', 'About Death') that belie their essential similarity:

hanson short little scale fragments in either free rhythm or a subdivided tempo that di-

verge only slightly from an extremely simple chord structure with little in the way of modulation or modal change. In short, the recordings themselves are as predictable and pedestrian as the description of the artist is fascinating. In some cases this kind of extreme disjuncture of supplied fact and what's actually on the tape might really fascinate me, but the recordings themselves are just too close to the generic synthesizer noodlefest to hold my attention. Given that the recordings are well mixed, perhaps the producer might see fit to ah... offer a little guidance to his reclusive friend." - Greg Taylor

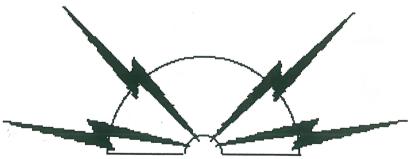

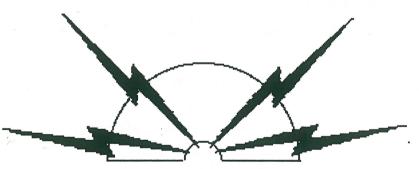
